National Academy Foundation - *NAF* is a national network of education, business, and community leaders who work together to ensure high school students are college, career, and future ready.

NAF's educational design ignites students' passion for learning and gives businesses the opportunity to shape America's future workforce by transforming the learning environment to include STEM infused industry-specific curricula and work-based learning experiences, including internships.

Since 1980, NAF has been partnering with high-need communities to improve outcomes for students by implementing NAF academies – small learning communities within existing high schools.

NAF has grown from one NAF Academy of Finance in New York City to hundreds of academies across the country focusing on growing industries including: finance, hospitality & tourism, information technology, engineering, and health sciences. During the 2021-2022 school year, over 117,000 students attended 619 NAF academies across 34 states, plus DC, Puerto Rico, and the US Virgin Islands. In 2020, NAF academies reported 99% of seniors graduated with 87% of graduates planning to go to college.

Birmingham City Schools involvement with NAF extends back to 2012 when Career Academies of Birmingham established academies in every high school. Currently, there are 10 active academies to include a National award winning Distinguished and Model Academies

Academy of Visual Communications G. W. CARVER HIGH SCHOOL

PREREQUISITES: NONE | STARTING GRADE: 10TH

The Academy of Visual Communications (AOV) provides preparation for students interested in the fields of animation, TV production, and graphic arts. Students will use creativity and technology to design and produce a variety of visual materials. Students will learn visual arts principles and techniques that will prepare them for the creative design and entertainment fields. Careers in this pathway include animator, multimedia artist, film maker, graphic designer, video and web producer, broadcaster, desktop publisher, film and video editor, and more.

Program Design

Along with their required courses and CTE requirements, Academy students can take dual enrollment courses for college credit while enrolled in high school. Every student is encouraged to take at least two years of foreign language. Academy students work as interns at related industry settings.

Industry Certifications

Industry certifications are an important component of Career Academies and CTE Programs verifying that students have demonstrated technical skill attainment. Select industry certifications have been approved at the state level for free college credits awarded to students.

Career Academies

Career academies combine a college-preparatory curriculum with a career-themed focus, aligned to Career Clusters. Students enrolled in career academies follow a sequential CTE program of study that leads to industry certification and opportunities to earn postsecondary credit and scholarships.

Career and Technical Student Organizations (CTSO)

Some of the most exciting and satisfying times of a CTE student's education can be his/her experience in Career and Technical Student Organizations (CTSOs) contests and leadership activities. CTSOs are a basic component of CTE programs that provide students with skills and knowledge to succeed in their chosen career field.

Students have the opportunity to compete at the district, region, state and national levels for the promotion of teamwork, occupational excellence, leadership and citizenship.

Academy Code of Conduct

The Academy of Hospitality and Tourism will adhere to the Code of Conduct outlined by Birmingham City Schools in every regard.

Attendance

All students are expected to attend school and Academy events on a regular bases as well as be on time. A doctor's excuse or parent note is required to mark absence as excused. Please adhere to the regular attendance policy of Birmingham City Schools.

Dress Policy

Academy students will wear the Academy garments provided to every event. If these garments are lost or damaged, it is the responsibility of the student/parent to replace these items. If these items are not available student will not be able to participate in the event. Lost/damaged items may have an effect on grade and successful completion of the program.

During Academy events students are not allowed to wear excessive jewelry, unnatural color hair, or inappropriate clothing items. Failure to comply with rules can result in student not being allowed to participate in the event which will also have an effect on grade and successful completion of the program.

Extended Classroom Experiences

As a part of the program, student will have classes outside of the traditional setting. These opportunities are **required** to successful gain information from industry professionals. These are hands on learning experiences. Any absences form the regular classroom is excused and students are able to make up work. However, all work must be made up in a timely manner. Students in the Academy have a cluster of teachers who work together to make these experiences possible. There is a working relationship and there should be no conflict. In the event of conflict please see the Academy Coordinator for assistance.

Permission Forms

All students must provide written permission slip to attend Extended Classroom Experiences. Failure to comply with rules may result in student not being allowed to participate in the event which will also have an effect on grade and successful completion of the program.

Media Releases

We are very proud of our accomplishments therefore events of the Academy are highly publicized in the media, school and district website as well as social media. All students/parents must complete a media release form giving authorization to publish pictures and written information. It is the responsibility of the student/parent to update this information if there are any changes and information can no longer be shared.

Admission Policy

Students must be enrolled in a Birmingham City Schools High School. They must have completed 9th grade, or in the process of finishing their last semester of their 9th grade year. You must have a 2.0 GPA at the time of applying and obtain two (2) teacher recommendations.
