ANALYZE CRAFT AND STRUCTURE ➔ **ARGUMENT**

In an **argument**, the author presents his or her opinion and tries to persuade readers to agree with that opinion or act on it.

An argument is based on a central **claim**, or statement of the author's position. This claim reflects the author's **perspective**, or how he or she views a subject. The claim should be supported by logical reasons—reasons that will make sense to the reader. These reasons should be supported by evidence, such as facts, statistics, expert opinions, and examples.

It is no secret that the garbage Americans produce is an issue, but underlying that issue is the amount of that garbage that ends up lining highways, city streets, and sidewalks. Billions of tons of garbage are tossed out car windows, thrown in the gutter, or accidentally blown out of trucks. Littering is a serious issue that must stop.

First of all, litter costs the government money. In fact, over 11 billion dollars were spent last year cleaning up other people's messes. Not any less important: litter destroys the environment. Litter is not only ugly but is also dangerous. Because billions of tons of garbage is incorrectly disposed of each year, it ends up in the ocean. There, sea birds are feeding plastic to their young that are starving for real food. In the stomachs of most sea life, plastic can be found.

An easy solution would involve people simply cleaning up after themselves. Every community must get involved in clean-up and prevention.
